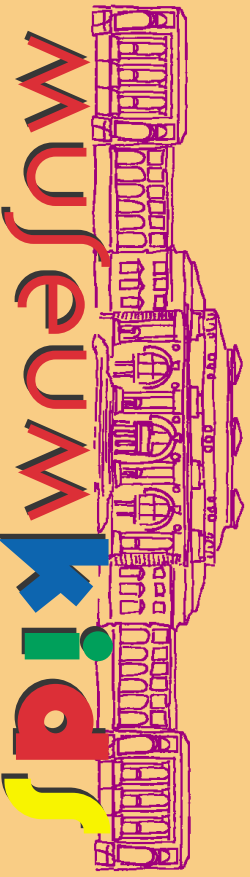

Guess What?

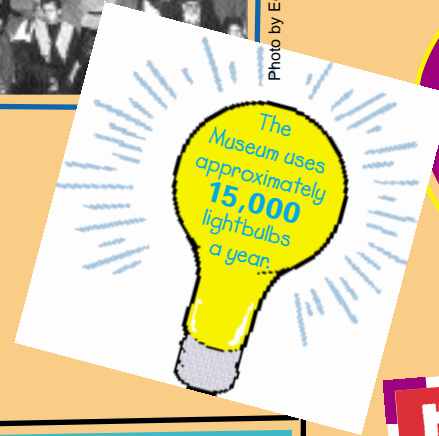
The greatest number of people to visit the Museum in one day was **52,333** on December 30, 1986. That's as many people as would fit on about **ninety-one jumbo jets**. Each year, about five million people visit the Museum, which has two million square feet.

More than **TWO MILLION** works of art are owned by the Museum, which has seventeen curatorial departments to take care of them all.



The Museum uses approximately **15,000** lightbulbs a year.

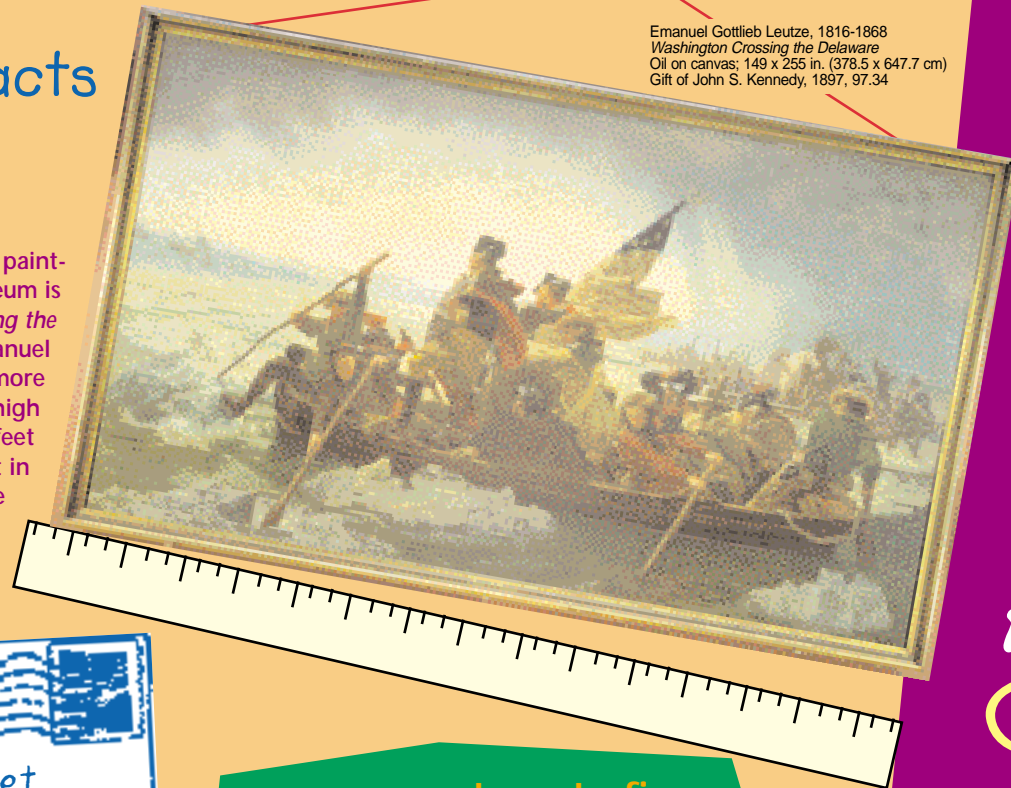

The Museum sells more than **ONE AND A HALF MILLION** postcards in a year.



Approximately **twenty five hundred people** work in the Museum. Nine hundred and thirty eight of them are volunteers.

KIDS' TOP 10

We asked some kids for the main reasons they think people visit the Museum. Here are the top ten reasons that were given:

1. To see the **TEMPLE OF DENDUR**.
2. To see the **BEAUTIFUL THINGS** that are there.
3. To see the **GIFT SHOP** and to get stuff.
4. To see an **EXHIBIT** advertised on one of the three flags (banners) outside the Museum.
5. To have **FUN**.
6. Because people are interested in **HISTORY** and art of **DIFFERENT CULTURES** and **COUNTRIES**.
7. To **SEE THINGS WE HAVE NEVER SEEN** and to find out about places we will never get to visit.
8. To find out what happened to old **ANCIENT GREEK** people.
9. To learn about **DINOSAURS**.
10. They **MAKE YOU GO** there.

The **lowdown**: This Museum does not have dinosaurs. It does have fossils on some of the works of art made of stone, and there are even fossils embedded in the floor in the Medieval Sculpture Hall.

The Children's bookshop on the second floor of the Museum carries **1,214** different books. It also carries 792 toys, games, puzzles, CD-ROMS, videos, and audio cassettes—in other words, anything that isn't a book.

Q Who had more visitors last year, the Metropolitan Museum of Art or the New York Mets baseball team?

A The Metropolitan Museum of Art had 5.4 million visitors last year, more than the Mets and the Yankees combined. And remember, the Yankees won the World Series.

Q Do a lot of people visit from outside the city?

A Yes. Sixty eight percent of visitors, or 3.67 million people, come from outside New York City.

Q What foreign countries do visitors come from?

On March 2, 1999, the Museum debuted its new **admission button** for the millenium. It comes in sixteen colors.



A Practically all of them. We get the most visitors from England, Canada, Germany, Brazil, France, Australia, and the Netherlands.

Q Aren't most people who visit the Met pretty old?

A The average age of adult visitors is around 35 to 40, probably around the age of many of your parents. Ask them if they're pretty old. Also, hundreds of thousands of kids visit the Museum every year.

Q How long do people stay when they visit?

A The average stay is around 2 to 2.5 hours, although some people stay for more than four hours at a time. It seems that the farther away from the Museum people live, the longer their stay. Local people are more likely to stay for a shorter period of time and come back again another day.

Cleaning Up

Like any other building, the Museum needs to be cleaned, both inside and out. The building is so large that **ENORMOUS AMOUNTS OF CLEANING SUPPLIES** need to be used. Here are some of the supplies that were ordered in one thirteen-month period:

- 2,100 gallons of **FLOOR CLEANER**
- 1,125 gallons of **CARPET CLEANER**
- 400 gallons of **LIQUID WAX** for high-traffic areas
- forty cases of **GUM REMOVER**
- fifteen cases of **SPOT REMOVER** for carpet stains

The **lowdown**: All cleaning products used by the Museum are environmentally safe.

A MUSEUM FIRST

The first object accepted by the Museum, was the **Sarcophagus Decorated with Garlands** in 1870. You can find it right inside the main entrance at 82nd Street. Do you see the garlands (ropes and leaves)?

The **EGYPTIAN DEPARTMENT** is one of the only departments in the Museum that has all its objects on view—in this case, 33,000—unless they're being cleaned or restored or are being used in another exhibition. Out of all the mummy cases on display, **THIRTEEN ACTUALLY CONTAIN BODIES**—twelve adults and one child.

WHY DO YOU VISIT THE METROPOLITAN MUSEUM?

AS FOR THE ADULTS...

Here are the reasons that adult visitors gave for visiting the Museum:

Most people tell us that they are visiting for **EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES**, for **INSPIRATION**, and for **RELAXATION**. When we ask what they plan to do at the Met, most people say they are going to visit a special exhibition or the permanent collection. A lot of visitors like to go to the shops, too.
