carvings of papyrus and lotus plants that seem to grow from water and the two columns on the porch rise toward the sky like tall bundles of papyrus stalks with lotus blossoms bound with them. Above the gate and temple entrance are images of the sun disk flanked by the outspread wings of Horus, the sky god. The sky is also represented by the vultures, wings outspread, that appear on the ceiling of the entrance porch. The temple honors the Egyptian goddess Isis and two sons of a local ruler.
