### **Getting Started**

All applicants to The Met's Fellowship Program must apply online through the following submission portal: <a href="https://webportalapp.com/sp/met\_museum\_fellowships\_science">https://webportalapp.com/sp/met\_museum\_fellowships\_science</a>

After creating an account and logging in, all applicants must fill out the following "Profile" section. This section can be updated at any point throughout and after the application process.

After filling in the "Profile" section, applicants must fill out an application form and request letters of recommendation. Applicants may only apply for one fellowship type per application cycle. The only exception to this is the Fellowship in History of Art and Visual Culture, for which applicants may apply concurrently with the Leonard A. Lauder Fellowship and the Andrew W. Mellon Curatorial Fellowship. Applicants must check off each fellowship for which they are applying in the "Application Form." Sections asking for required materials will then automatically populate. Required materials for each fellowship category in the application form can be found in subsequent sections of this document.

To request letters of recommendation, applicants must click on the "Letters of Recommendation" tab. Guidelines for adding recommenders and monitoring recommendations will be found on that page. We require three (3) letters of recommendation, at least one academic and one professional, none of which may be written by current Met staff members. <u>Applicants eligible to apply to more than one category of fellowship should submit three recommendations for EACH fellowship category</u>. Current fellows who are applying for a renewal of their fellowship must submit two (2) recommendations.

## **Conservation Fellowship and Scientific Research Fellowship Application**

The deadline for all application materials, including transcripts and letters of recommendation, is the first Friday in December at 5 pm EST / 10 pm GMT. Late materials will not be accepted.

The Met offers junior- and senior-level fellowships in conservation and scientific research and a two-year Research Scholarship in Photograph Conservation.

- Junior conservation fellowships and scientific research fellowships are intended for those who have recently completed graduate-level training.
- Senior conservation fellowships and scientific research fellowships are intended for wellestablished professionals with at least eight years of experience in the field and a proven publication record, or those who have their PhD in hand by the application deadline.



• The Research Scholarship in Photograph Conservation is a two-year fellowship intended for those who have a graduate degree in conservation or equivalent experience and should be completely committed to the conservation of photographs as his or her area of specialization.
