

Morocco: Land of Mists & Mysteries

Dear Members and Friends of The Metropolitan Museum of Art,

Over the last 10,000 years, the country Edith Wharton called "a land of mists and mysteries" has been home to Berbers, Arabs, sub-Saharan Africans, Romans, the French, and more. I hope you'll join me next March to discover the art and architecture of Morocco on this exciting journey, which for the first time includes the rarely visited UNESCO World Heritage Site of Tétouan.



Our exploration begins with a visit to the monumental Hassan II Mosque, the largest in Morocco. From there we will venture to the capital city of Rabat, to marvel at the unfinished and stunning Hassan Tower and the white marble tomb of King Mohammed V. We will then travel by high-speed train to Tangier to discover the unique blend of cultural influences displayed in the Kasbah Museum. In nearby Tétouan, admire the diversity of Moroccan arts, from traditional handicrafts to contemporary

canvases.

In Fes, spend four nights in a palace that was once the residence of the Grand Vizier of Jamaï, learn how Moroccan ceramic tiles are produced and explore the mellah, or old Jewish quarter. Marvelous Meknes, a 17th-century rival to Versailles, is our base for a visit to Volubilis, one of the best-preserved Roman towns in North Africa. In Marrakesh, the great public square of Djemaa el-Fna is a special highlight, as are the opulent Majorelle Gardens. We will also visit the new Yves Saint Laurent Museum, dedicated to the designer who found his muse in the "red city."

I hope you will join me on this immersion in the diverse arts and cultures of Morocco.

Traveling with You


Courtney Ann Stewart joined the museum in 2010 and serves as Senior Research Assistant in the Department of Islamic Art. She has contributed to the reinstallation of the new galleries of the Arab Lands, Turkey, Iran, Central Asia, and Later South Asia (2011), as well as the exhibitions and publications Treasures from India: Jewels from the Al-Thani Collection (2014) and Sultans of Deccan India, 1500-1700: Opulence and Fantasy (2015). Courtney has taught courses on Islamic art history at the University of Toronto, and she continues to lecture in the School of Continuing Studies at New York University. Courtney, who holds graduate degrees from the University of Toronto and the Bard Graduate Center, is currently pursuing research on the history of Islamic jewelry.

Trip Highlights

- Explore seven UNESCO World Heritage Sites, including the lesser-known city of Tétouan
- Spend four nights in Fes at the luxurious Palais Faraj, once the residence of the Grand Vizier of Jamaï
- Tour Meknes, a 17th-century rival to Versailles; and the well-preserved Roman ruins at Volubilis
- Watch master craftspeople create exquisite ceramics by hand at a family-run studio near Fes
- Gain insight into the work of Met conservators on a behind-the-scenes tour of a 12th-century *minbar* (Islamic pulpit)
- Discover the recently opened YSL Museum in Marrakesh, dedicated to the designer who found inspiration in Moroccan culture






Royal Palace, Fes

U.S. Departure

Friday, March 8

Depart on an overnight flight to Casablanca.

Casablanca / Rabat, Morocco

Saturday, March 9

Arrive in Casablanca and continue to the vast Hassan II Mosque, to admire its dramatic architecture and interiors. After lunch, drive along the coast to the capital city of Rabat, to check in at the Sofitel Jardin des Roses. Gather this evening for introductory remarks and a welcome dinner.

Rabat

Sunday, March 10

Following a morning lecture, the day's touring begins with the Hassan tower and the white marble tomb of King Mohammed V. At the Archaeological Museum, admire the collection, which offers an overview of Morocco's impressive history. In the afternoon, visit the ancient Chellah necropolis ruins and the Mohammed VI Museum of Modern & Contemporary Art. This three-story Moorish building features over 400 pieces by 200 Moroccan artists. Dinner is at leisure. B, L

Rabat / Tangier

Monday, March 11

Travel by the new high-speed train to Tangier.
Upon arrival, visit the American Legation
Museum, the only U.S. National Historic
Landmark outside the United States, and
tour the Kasbah Museum, also known as the
Museum of Moroccan Art and Antiquities.
Time permitting, admire the Moulay Hafid
Palace (*Palais des Institutions Italiennes*),
Tangier's most beautiful building. This evening,
dinner is at the hotel.

Tangier / Tétouan

Tuesday, March 12

Drive to nearby Tétouan, with its UNESCO-recognized medina. Tour the Museum of Modern Art, housing a permanent collection of contemporary Moroccan art, and view traditional Moroccan costumes, jewelry, embroidery, weapons, and musical instruments at the Ethnography Museum. Return to Tangier for an evening at leisure.

Tangier / Fes

Wednesday, March 13

Travel to Fes, the oldest of Morocco's imperial cities, stopping for lunch in the magical blue city of Chefchaouen. Upon arrival in Fes, check in at the luxurious Palais Faraj Hotel.

Gather for a lecture before dinner.

Thursday, March 14

Visit the Nejjarine Funduq, an 18th-century caravanserai (inn) that is now a museum of wooden arts and crafts. Explore the Al Karaouine Mosque, including the reopened

library (pending confirmation). In the afternoon tour the Medersa Bou Inania and/or the Medersa el Attarine, both great examples of Islamic architecture, and explore the tannery quarter.

Meknes / Volubilis

Friday, March 15

Drive to Meknes, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, to see the beautiful Bab Mansour gate and shrine of Moulay Ismail. Continue to the Roman town of Volubilis, where houses are adorned with mosaics from the 2nd and 3rd centuries. Return to Fes for an evening at leisure. B, L

Fes

Saturday, March 16

Drive to the Fes Arabesque Ceramic Factory /
Art Naji Studio to view ceramists at work and
learn the history and secrets of Morocco's
famously beautiful pottery. Continue to
Dar Batha Museum, the city's museum of
traditional Moroccan arts, set in a gorgeous
19th-century palace that is itself a work of
art. Lunch and the afternoon are at leisure,
perhaps to enjoy a mint tea or shop for local
handicrafts. Tonight, dine at one of the city's
charming riads (traditional houses with
interior courtyards).

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Tetouan

Fes / Marrakesh

Sunday, March 17

Begin the day with a glimpse into Morocco's Jewish heritage on an exploration of the picturesque mellah, once one of the largest Jewish quarters in the country. Then, fly to the fascinating "red city" of Marrakesh and check in at the Four Seasons Resort Marrakesh. Dinner tonight is at a popular B, L, D local restaurant.

Marrakesh

Monday, March 18

Visit Ben Yousef Madersa, a beautifully restored Koranic school. After a morning lecture, discover this masterpiece of 16thcentury architecture before a special visit to the Dar Fl Bacha Museum. In the afternoon. walk through the medina to the vibrant Djemael-Fna Square, where dancers, story-tellers, and snake charmers still practice their trades. We will also stop at the El Badii Palace to see the Koutoubia minbar (pulpit), beautifully restored by Met conservators. Conclude with a cocktail at the MACMA (Musée d'Art et de Culture de Marrakech). B, L, R

Marrakesh

Tuesday, March 19

Stroll in the lush Jardin Majorelle before a curator-led visit to the Berber Museum, with its rich collection of Berber objects. Then, enjoy a private visit to Villa Oasis, the home of the late fashion designer Yves Saint Laurent (pending confirmation). After lunch, discover the recently opened YSL Museum, full of couture gowns and the history of the designer's time living in Marrakesh. The balance of the day is at leisure. B. L

Marrakesh / Casablanca

Wednesday, March 20

This morning, visit a few contemporary galleries to gain insights into Morocco's current art scene. Following lunch, drive to Casablanca and the Four Seasons for a onenight stay. Gather this evening for a festive farewell dinner.

Casablanca / Return

Thursday, March 21

Transfer to the airport for flights home.
