Dreams of Beauty in Cities of Steel: London & Glasgow Fashion

Dear Members and Friends of The Metropolitan Museum of Art,

This September, join me in the fashion capitals of London and Glasgow, as we go behind the scenes of world-class museums, fashion collections, high-end department stores, and design studios. In the late 19th century and early 20th century, artists, architects, and designers in these cities redefined beauty in a rapidly industrializing world. Through the Arts and Crafts movement, these passionate crusaders, led by William Morris in London and Charles Rennie Mackintosh in Glasgow, also grappled with issues that resonate to this day—sustainability and the ethical treatment of workers. As a fashion historian, I'm excited to share the role that fashion plays in this still-unfolding story.

Our journey begins, suitably, on London's famous Savile Row, with a private look at a bespoke fashion house, and we'll have behind-the-scenes access to one of London's most renowned fashion colleges (pending confirmation). For a fascinating view of high-end retail fashion, we will experience a before-hours inside look at London's iconic Selfridges flagship store, which opened in 1909. We will also enjoy a special exploration of the Victoria and Albert Museum's historical garments, which range from 17th-century gowns to 1960s daywear and beyond. Then, we will travel by train to Glasgow, Scotland's largest city. There, one of many highlights will be special access to the Hill House, the Art Nouveau home of married artists Charles Rennie Mackintosh and Margaret Macdonald Mackintosh. The couple designed, decorated, and meticulously furnished this awe-inspiring building, which is now innovatively preserved in a steel enclosure known as "The Box." On a private tour of the Glasgow School of Art, which Charles designed, we will have full access to their archives and textile collections, with a focus on the "Glasgow Girls," the city's trailblazing female designers of the early 20th century. Nearby, in the town of Paisley—famous for the Persian-inspired pattern—we'll join two textile curators at Paisley: The Secret Collection, a museum housing historical paisley garments and other items, some unseen by the public for decades.

Exclusive access to contemporary design studios will further enrich this exciting itinerary. I hope to share this enriching look at art, history, and fashion with you in Britain this fall. Sincerely,

Jessica Glasscock is an author, independent curator, and, since 2003, a lecturer in fashion history at Parsons School of Design. She joined The Metropolitan Museum of Art in 2004. In 2010, she began her decade-long tenure as a research associate at The Met's Costume Institute, where she developed public programming for exhibitions from 2011's Alexander McQueen: Savage Beauty through 2019's Camp: Notes on Fashion. Her writings include the books Striptease: From Gaslight to Spotlight (2003), American Fashion Accessories (2008, in collaboration with Candy Pratts Price), and Making a Spectacle: A Fashionable History of Eyewear (2021).

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Savile Row, London

Departure

Sunday, September 11 Depart for London on an overnight flight.

London, England, United Kingdom

Monday, September 12

Upon arrival in London, transfer to your hotel. Later in the afternoon, gather with your fellow travelers for a gentle stroll along Savile Row, which occupies a quiet corner of Mayfair in London's West End. Named after Lady Dorothy Savile, the wife of the 3rd Earl of Burlington, Savile Row began as a residential enclave. Henry Poole moved his tailoring business into the neighborhood in the late 1840s. By the 20th century, Savile Row had firmly shifted its character into a thriving street of suit makers. Today, step into a well-known bespoke fashion house to learn its history and traditions. This evening, gather with fellow travelers for a celebratory welcome dinner at an elegant restaurant. D

London

Tuesday, September 13 After a morning lecture, travel to the Red House, William Morris' former family home and one of the most influential buildings in the history of domestic architecture and garden design. Morris' architect friend, Philip Webb, designed this gem of early Arts and Crafts architecture in 1859. After lunch, go behind the scenes at one of London's most acclaimed fashion colleges (pending schedules). This evening, dinner is at leisure.

London / Glasgow, Scotland

Wednesday, September 14

Early this morning, enjoy a special private tour of the iconic Selfridges department store before public hours. Discover the history behind this neoclassical landmark and how it disrupted the world of retail in the U.K. when opened in 1909. Meet an expert to learn the secrets behind its meticulously composed visual merchandising, and experience the cutting-edge fashion and flair of this top shopping hub. Afterwards, head to the Victoria and Albert Museum, whose fashion collection is the largest and most comprehensive collection of dress in the world, spanning five centuries. This afternoon, transfer to Glasgow by train. The remainder of the day is at leisure. B, L

Glasgow

Thursday, September 15

At the turn of the 20th century, four key artistic figures—Charles Rennie Mackintosh, Herbert MacNair, and Margaret and Frances Macdonald—were known as "The Four." They developed the Arts and Crafts-influenced Glasgow Style, and the Glasgow School of Art was central to their movement. After a morning lecture, join a private tour of this

higher education institution dedicated to visual creative disciplines. Our tour will feature a visit to the Archives and Collections, with a special focus on the "Glasgow Girls," and a behind-the-scenes tour of the Centre for Advanced Textiles. After lunch at leisure, see the special collection of James McNeill Whistler's limpid prints, drawings, and paintings at the Hunterian Art Gallery. You will also visit the Mackintosh House, the reconstructed home of the Scottish architect, designer, and artist, Charles Rennie Mackintosh and his wife, the artist Margaret Macdonald Mackintosh, where they lived from 1906 to 1914. Glasgow

Friday, September 16

Travel to Hill House, which is among Britain's most iconic pieces of Art Nouveau architecture. Explore this unique building, with its interiors and collection designed by Charles Rennie Mackintosh and Margaret Macdonald Mackintosh. Notably, the National Trust of Scotland has innovatively installed the home within a steel enclosure known as "The Box," aiming to preserve this architectural masterpiece while also allowing a unique experience for visitors. Savor lunch at the Willow Tea Rooms, whose interiors were designed by Charles Rennie Mackintosh and George Walton. This afternoon, we plan to gain exclusive access to a multi-awardwinning, internationally acclaimed design studio specializing in imaginative handprinted wallpapers, blinds, and fabrics. This evening, enjoy dinner at leisure. B, L
